Just over half of these deaths result from self-inflicted gunshot wounds, which is to be expected given that 9 out of 10 attempts involving a firearm result in death. Suicide research has demonstrated that prohibiting or reducing access to lethal means, or reducing the lethality of lethal means is an effective intervention for reducing suicide risk. The focus of studying lethal means in suicide research has recently emphasized firearms more strongly, and the literature has yielded strategies to increase the acceptability of lethal means counseling among at-risk individuals; however, strategies have yet to be empirically proven that effectively influence behavioral outcomes (id est, increased engagement in firearm safety behaviors/thoughts). The present study sought to accomplish this. Nationally recruited at-risk, gun-owning community participants (n = 23) were randomly assigned to one of two intervention groups: 1) standard intervention (id est, suicide risk assessment, safety planning, and lethal means counseling) with a gun lock and instructional video for its proper use, and 2) standard intervention without a gun lock or instructional video. Public health research findings have provided compelling evidence that administering gun locks increases gun safety behaviors in average gun-owners. Accordingly, we hypothesized that among an at-risk sample of gun-owners, administering gun locks would interact with time to increase Engagement in Firearm Safety Behaviors, Intentions to Adhere to Clinician Recommendations, Recommending to Others to Adhere to Clinician Recommendations, and Acceptability of

lethal means safety intervention. Hypotheses were tested using Linear Mixed Modeling and demonstrated no interaction effects for group x time. However, main effects for time on Intentions to Adhere to Clinician Recommendations and on Acceptability of Intervention were found and elaborated on in greater detail in our discussion. Findings cited by the National Center for Health Statistics show a 33% increase in the U.S. suicide rate over the past two decades. According to the National Centers for Injury Prevention and Control's Web-based Injury Statistics Query and Reporting System (WISQARS), two-thirds of gun deaths are suicides and half of all suicides involve guns. Suicide death risk is three times higher if there is access to a firearm. Multiple studies have shown a significant reduction in firearm related suicide if firearms are stored safely. The Tacoma-Pierce County Health Department (TPCHD) conducted three education and distribution events where locking firearm storage devices were given out after participants received instruction on proper device usage. The purpose of this study was to provide a better understanding of how occupation and perception of neighborhood safety are associated with safe firearm storage practices in order to guide the focus of future community-based programs, efforts, and policies, which would then ultimately decrease gun related suicide and unintentional injury and death. Methods In this study, we performed cross-sectional analysis of the data of TPCHD's safe firearm storage event survey. We studied data from 496 respondents who participated in three safe firearm storage events in Pierce County, WA. We used logistic regression to evaluate the associations between: 1) safe firearm storage practices and low skill vs high skill occupations; 2) safe firearm storage practices and working as a first responder; and 3) safe firearm storage practices and perception of neighborhood safety, adjusted for relevant confounders. To determine low vs high skill occupations, the responses were manually coded into categories based on the sectors from the 2017 North American Industry Classification System. These sectors were then divided into low vs high skill occupations based on research presented by the Lincoln Institute of Land Management. Participants were asked directly on the survey of their first responder status. Perception of neighborhood safety was measured by dichotomizing participant responses to a ten-point scale asking how safe they perceive their neighborhoods to be with numbers one to five equating to "not safe" and numbers six to ten equating to "safe". In all three analyses, effect

modification by sex, children living in or visiting the home, and military service was assessed. Results Low skill occupations were associated with a higher level of safe firearm storage. Low skill occupations had 1.74 (95% CI 1.02, 2.99) times the odds of safe firearm storage, after adjusting for sex. There was attenuation noted after further adjusting this model for children living in or visiting the home and military status. No significant associations were noted between first responder status nor perception of neighborhood safety and safe firearm storage practices.

Conclusion This study demonstrated an association between occupational skill level and safe firearm storage practices. To our knowledge, it is the first study to look at how environmental factors such as perception of neighborhood safety might influence safe firearm storage practices. Future research looking at the association between specific occupations and how environmental factors might influence safe firearm storage practices is needed.

The growing concern over the number of accidental firearm shootings, especially those involving children, prompted passage of the initial handgun safety law which went into effect in 1994. The stated intent of the California Legislature in enacting the current FSC law is for persons who obtain firearms to have a basic familiarity with those firearms, including, but not limited to, the

safe handling and storage of those firearms. The statutory authority for this program is contained in Penal Code sections 26840 and 31610 through 31700. These statutes mandate DOJ to develop, implement and maintain the FSC Program. Pursuant to Penal Code section 26840, a firearms dealer cannot deliver a firearm unless the person receiving the firearm presents a valid FSC, which is obtained by passing a written test on firearm safety. Prior to taking delivery of a firearm from a licensed firearms dealer, the purchaser/recipient must also successfully perform a safe handling demonstration with that firearm.. In 2010, more than 105,000 people were injured or killed in the United States as the result of a firearm-related incident. Recent, highly publicized, tragic mass shootings in Newtown, CT; Aurora, CO; Oak Creek, WI; and Tucson, AZ, have sharpened the American public's interest in protecting our children and communities from the harmful effects of firearm violence. While many Americans legally use firearms for a variety of activities, fatal and nonfatal firearm violence poses a serious threat to public safety and welfare. Currently, there is no known research on teaching gun safety skills to individuals with developmental disabilities. Research has shown that children typically engage in gunplay behaviors if they find a firearm. These behaviors can lead to unintentional firearm injuries and even death, especially for young children. Previous research has shown the success of video modeling for teaching various skills to individuals with autism. This study examined the effectiveness of video modeling for teaching gun safety skills to three children with autism spectrum disorder, and found that video modeling was effective for one participant, but in situ training was needed to promote maintenance. For a second participant, IST was effective for skill acquisition and maintenance. Finally, a modified IST procedure was effective for a third participant when implemented by a trainer but not when implemented by his mother. From the Foreword

It should also be helpful to collectors of NFA firearms and other persons having questions about the application of the NFA. This publication is not a law book. Rather, it is intended as a ?user friendly? reference book enabling the user to quickly find answers to questions concerning the NFA. Nevertheless, it should also be useful to attorneys seeking basic information about the NFA and how the law has been interpreted by ATF. The book's Table of Contents will be helpful to the user in locating needed information. Although the principal focus of the handbook is the NFA, the book necessarily covers provisions of the Gun Control Act of 1968 and the Arms Export Control Act impacting NFA firearms businesses and collectors. Each year, gun homicides kill over ten thousand people in the United States. While most guns are

initially purchased legally, many enter the underground market and end up in the hands of dangerous offenders, such as gang members and convicted felons. This issue of *RSF*, edited by public policy scholars Philip J. Cook and Harold A. Pollack, brings together eight articles exploring the markets for guns, both legal and illegal. The contributors draw from new datasets and interviews with inmates to examine how offenders obtain guns. By turning a spotlight on these little-understood supply chains, these chapters provide guidance for stemming the flow of guns to the underground market. Cook and Pollack initiate the discussion with a comprehensive introduction that includes an original framework for understanding the legality of transactions that arm dangerous offenders. Several contributors review trends in gun ownership across the nation and investigate how guns enter the underground market. Deborah Azrael and coauthors conduct a comprehensive survey of gun owners and find 270 million guns in private circulation. They estimate that 70 million firearms changed hands during a recent five-year period. Most of those transactions were sales by licensed dealers; Garen Wintemute reports on a survey of dealers that assesses the wide disparities among them as sources of guns to offenders. Charles Wellford and coauthors use trace data and prison interviews to study how criminals obtain their guns in three jurisdictions that differ widely with respect to gun regulations and culture. Other contributors explore the effects of gun regulations and legislation on illegal supply chains. Daniel Webster and coauthors study the effects of Maryland's 2013 Firearm Safety Act, which required all handgun purchasers to obtain a license. They find that 41 percent of surveyed parolees reported that it was more difficult to obtain a handgun after the law passed due to increased cost, lack of trusted sources, or people being less willing to buy handguns on their behalf. Analyzing over three decades of data on handguns recovered in Boston, Anthony Braga shows that fewer guns are illegally obtained from states that adopt legislation restricting buyers to one gun per month. George Tita and coauthors report the results of an inmate survey in Los Angeles in which they explored respondents' knowledge of gun laws. These findings suggest that laws aimed at legal gun transactions may also decrease the entry of guns into the underground market. The rate of gun violence in the U.S.

surpasses that of any other advanced nation. This issue of RSF offers new empirical research on the underground market that arms dangerous criminals and provides a rich foundation for policies designed to curb gun violence. The book includes an analysis of the constitutionality of many recommended policies and data from a national public opinion poll that reflects support among the majority of Americans—including gun owners—for stronger gun policies.
