In a new poem, "Earlier," the poet investigates a kind of paradox: What is the oldest word for dawn in any language? The pursuit ultimately descends into the roots of speech, the genesis of art. "Earlier" is part of a sequence devoted to prehistoric themes: the cave paintings of Altamira, the disappearance of the Neanderthals, the poet's journey with his teenage daughter to excavate a triceratops skeleton in Montana . . . The author of six novels as well, Leithauser not surprisingly brings to his verse a

flair for compelling narrative: a fateful romantic encounter on a streetcar ("1944: Purple Heart"); the mesmerizing arrival of television in a quiet Detroit neighborhood ("Not Lunar Exactly"); two boys heedlessly, joyfully bidding permanent farewell to a beloved sister ("Emigrant's Story"). The Oldest Word for Dawn reveals Brad Leithauser as a poet of surpassing tenderness and exactitude, a poet whose work, at sixty, fulfills the promise noted by James Merrill on the publication of his first book: "The observations glisten, the feelings ring true. These poems by a young, unostentatious craftsman are made to something very like perfection. No one should overlook them." Publisher Description Robert Service wrote in the golden years of the Klondike--of the rough and ready men, and women just as tough. No-one in Robert's world (real or imagined) minced words or had any self-consciousness about them. It was live and let live and sometimes kill or be killed. "Collected Poems of Robert Service" reflects those times. Reading "Collected Poems of Robert Service" transports us back to that frozen place in nature when it was literally every man and every woman for him/herself. Somehow Service conveys only a sensitivity, but the beauties he saw in the others. Never far from her dictionary, she was always sharpening her skills, page by page, puzzle by puzzle. To my great misfortune, just when I started to get to know the woman behind the words, did she begin to lose them. Because of her dementia, the pathway to connecting with her became rocky. Obstructed by confusion, fear, and uncertainty, she slowly faded from us. After her death, we found the full records of her poetry, some of which we now lovingly share with the world. Over the years, I have much admired my late brother's artistic abilities, as evidenced by my homage to him in my poem, "The Master," which can be found within this collection. Written in the late 1980's, these poems helped me deal with pent-up, late teenage angst, and those creative cravings that demanded a release; I was in university at the time. Originally produced in a limited, unpublished run of ten books, in December 1987, it never occurred to me to publish the collection to a wider audience - until now. I lost my brother in August of 2018, and I thought that one way of honoring his memory is to re-issue this collection in published form. In addition to the collection's original three pieces of art, I have added some additional pieces that are in my possession, and which he finished a few years later. I have also appended my September 2018 eulogy to my brother, as well as some photos to the end of this collection. A very close and dear, art college friend of Kai's, Mr. Paul R. James, is presently in the process of collecting and photographing much of my brother's extensive body of work, in hopes of bringing it out as a "coffee table" style, book of art. This will finally allow the public to view what Kai so stubbornly wanted to keep hidden because of his insecurities, and they will then see for themselves, the amazing talent that my brother once exhibited. As to these poems, when you read them you are reading the words of a much younger man, with a younger man's issues, and I am no longer that man. I have written and published some poetry since my university years in anthologies such as "Word Fest," and "Canadian Imprints," however, new writing projects beckon that will take my attention away from creating new poetry.

Please be kind to the younger man who composed these poems (I have to be!), and please note, that outside of a few tweaks here and there, they are largely as they were when first composed way back in the 1980's (warts and all). I hope you enjoy this small taste of my brother's art. He worked in a variety of artistic mediums, and was very good at all of them. It is a double tragedy that he refused to allow his art to be shown to a wider audience, and then, died before he ever achieved the recognition he so rightly deserved. The complete poems of Spike Milligan, consisting of three individual volumes now collected together (SMALL DREAMS OF A SCORPION, OPEN HEART UNIVERSITY and THE MIRROR RUNNING) as well as a number of previously unpublished poems. All the famous funny and rude poems are there, as well as a number of darker poems written during the war. The first complete showcase of "one of the true master poets of his generation," Galway Kinnell (1927-2014): a lifetime's work and a deeply lived life reflected in over two hundred poems. The poems in this volume are the author's attempts to put into words some of the inner particulars of his eighty-year journey on the planet and to share the amazing discoveries, realizations and frustrations he has experienced trying to make verbal translations of that adventure. Many of the poems acknowledge the inadequacy of our alphabet sounds and words to adequately represent our emotions, ideas and sensory experiences. Words are stand-ins, written or spoken sound symbols, maps for our inner territories, and not the territories themselves. The poem "Onomatopoesis" asserts that "the vowels howl out" and "the consonants deter deflect conflict" but do not actually share what we have experienced. Another, "Piecemeal," states that "what you're looking for is always hiding in the spaces between the words." The author hopes readers will use their own intuitive experiences to find whatever of him is hiding between his words and be left with some wonder and appreciation.

This book will take you on a passionate journey that will open up your hearts and allow you to feel what is written. This collaboration of poems will touch on things that are happening in everyday life to personal experiences. In this book, you will read poems, quotes, and expressions that speak about love, heartbreaks, friendship, betrayal, violence, strength, death, and pain. I hope that after reading this book, a piece of it sticks and stays with you. From the Pulitzer Prize-winning poet, a brilliant and witty collection of writings on the art and nature of poetry -- a master class both entertaining and provocative. The pieces have a broad range and many levels. In one, we sit with the teenage Mark Strand while he reads for the first time a poem that truly amazes him: “You, Andrew Marvell” by Archibald MacLeish, in which night sweeps in an unstoppable but exhilarating circle around the earth toward the speaker standing at noon. The essay goes on to explicate the poem, but it also evokes, through its form and content, the poem's meaning -- time's



circular passage -- with the young Strand first happening upon the poem, the older Strand seeing into it differently, but still amazed. Among the other subjects Strand explores: the relationship between photographs and poems, the eternal nature of the lyric, the contemporary use of old forms, four American views of Parnassus, and an alphabet of poetic influences. We visit as well Strandian parallel universes, whose absurdity illuminates the lack of a vital discussion of poetry in our culture at large: Borges drops in on a man taking a bath, perches on the edge of the tub, and discusses translation; a president explains in his farewell address why he reads Chekhov to his cabinet. Throughout *The Weather of Words*, Mark Strand explores the crucial job of poets and their readers, who together joyfully attempt the impossible -- to understand through language that which lies beyond words. The definitive sampling of a writer whose poems were “at the forefront of the Harlem Renaissance and of modernism itself, and today are fundamentals of American culture” (OPRAH Magazine). Here, for the first time, are all the poems that Langston Hughes published during his lifetime, arranged in the general order in which he wrote them. Lyrical and pungent, passionate and polemical, the result is a treasure of a book, the essential collection of a poet whose words have entered our common language. The collection spans five decades, and is comprised of 868 poems (nearly 300 of which never before appeared in book form) with annotations by Arnold Rampersad and David Roessel. Alongside such famous works as "The Negro Speaks of Rivers" and *Montage of a Dream Deferred*, *The Collected Poems* includes Hughes's lesser-known verse for children; topical poems distributed through the Associated Negro Press; and poems such as "Goodbye Christ" that were once suppressed.
