concerns on the comparability between the
national rules implementing this Directive and
the existing fundamental freedoms that are the
cornerstone of the European Union. This thesis
examines the possible infringements of the
Directive's transposition to the fundamental
freedoms enshrined in the Treaty of the
Functioning of the European Union. Some
recommendations with regard to ameliorating
the identified incompatibilities are also given by
using comparative legal research.
