**Smaller and Smaller Circles** Oct 10 2021 This harrowing mystery, winner of the Philippine National Book Award, follows two Catholic priests on the hunt through Manila for a brutal serial killer. Payatas, a 50-acre dump northeast of Manila's Quezon City, is home to thousands of people who live off of what they can scavenge there. It is one of the poorest neighborhoods in a city whose law enforcement is already stretched thin, devoid of forensic resources and rife with corruption. So when the eviscerated bodies of preteen boys begin to appear in the dump heaps, there is no one to seek justice on their behalf. In the rainy summer of 1997, two Jesuit priests take the matter of protecting their flock in

their own hands. Father Gus Saenz is a respected forensic anthropologist, one of the few in the Philippines, and has been tapped by the Director of the National Bureau of Investigations as a backup for police efforts. [Goya's Dog](#) Jul 07 2021 Our unforgettable anti-hero, Edward Dacres, is a pretentious misanthrope whose specialty is painting triangles. War has broken out and his fortunes in London have dwindled to nothing. So when a lucky case of mistaken identity gives him a chance to join a delegation to bring Art to the "Colonies," Dacres naturally seizes the opportunity to make a fresh start in Canada.
