Thus, the third section includes chapters on current directions in promoting children's learning from text, on the value of an integrated curriculum in promoting reading engagement, and on the challenges of assessing students' development as engaged readers. Finally, the broader conception of reading implied by the engagement perspective requires an expanded array of research approaches, sensitive to the complex and interacting contexts in which children develop literacy. The concluding section focuses on these important contemporary issues in literacy research and educational research, with chapters examining the variety of alternative modes of inquiry gaining prominence in literacy research, teacher inquiry, and ethical issues of collaboration between university and teacher researchers. Intended for university-based researchers, graduate students, and classroom teachers, this volume brings together researchers who think about students and their literacy development in school and home communities in distinctly different ways. The cooperative and collaborative inquiry presented contributes to a richer understanding of the many factors influencing engaged reading.

Reading Motivation and Reading Comprehension Nov 19 2020 Abstract: This study examined the relationship between reading motivation and reading comprehension in a sample of 421 twin pairs (MZ = 168, DZ = 253) recruited from The Western Reserve Reading Project. Reading motivation was assessed using the Motivation for Reading Questionnaire, a specific set of scales based on 11 dimensions of reading motivation. Reading comprehension was assessed using the Peabody Individual Achievement Test - Revised and the Woodcock Reading Mastery Test - Revised comprehension subtests. Latent factors were formed for reading motivation and reading comprehension using data from three annual home visits, beginning when children were 6 years old (M = 6.09, SD = .69). Results suggested that genetic, shared environmental, and nonshared environmental influences were significant for both reading motivation and reading comprehension factors. Moreover, the covariance between reading motivation and reading comprehension factors was influenced not only by genetic pathways, but also through nonshared environmental pathways. In contrast, estimates for shared environmental overlap between reading motivation and reading comprehension were not statistically significant. These results suggest that beyond genetic overlap the relationship between reading motivation and reading comprehension is also influenced by child-specific environmental effects, providing further support for individual influences on reading comprehension. Finally, results from the study suggest that children's reading skills and performance are associated with their engagement and desire to read, in part, above and beyond genetic factors related to motivation and comprehension.
