Feldman uses this discussion of deception to explore ways we can cope with infidelity, betrayal, and mistrust, in our friends and family. He also describes the lies we tell ourselves: Sometimes, the liar in your life is the person you see in the mirror. With incisive clarity and wry wit, Feldman has written a truthful book for anyone whose life has

Keith Simmons discusses the solutions proposed by medieval philosophers and offers his own solutions and in the process assesses other contemporary attempts to solve the paradox. Unlike such attempts, Simmons’ “singularity” solution does not abandon classical semantics and does not appeal to the kind of hierarchical view found in Barwise’s and Etchemendy’s *The Liar*. Moreover, Simmons’ solution resolves the vexing problem of semantic universality—the problem of whether there are semantic concepts beyond the expressive reach of a natural language such as English.
