Like many of his fellow playwrights,
Shakespeare turned to national history for
inspiration. In this study, Dominique Goy-
Blanquet provides a close comparison of the
Henry VI plays and Richard III with their
historical and theatrical sources, demonstrating
how Shakespeare was able to meet not only the

ideological but also the technical problems of
turning history into drama, how by cutting,
carving, shaping, casting his unwieldy material
into performable plays, he matured into the most
influential dramatist and historian of his
time. Recent criticism of Shakespeare's history
plays has often consisted of fierce arguments
over their ideological import and Shakespeare's
position on the spectrum of current political
opinions. This book, however, stems from the
belief that a more constructive starting point for
research is the exploration of the technical
problems raised by turning heavy narratives into
performable plays, rather than the political
motives that could inspire a playwright's
representation of national history. Illuminating
and instructive, Shakespeare's Early History
Plays includes not only close investigation of the
verbal, poetic, and political texture of the plays,
but also provides a broad overview of the wider
sixteenth-century historiographical contexts of
the plays, and their significance to Shakespeare's
oeuvre more generally. Using case studies of
Hamlet, Romeo and Juliet and Titus Andronicus,
this book examines what constitutes a
'Shakespearean text'. "Vivimos en el siglo XXI.
Unas calzas y un jubón no nos acercan más a
Shakespeare que unos tejanos y una camiseta".
Esto lo dice Paul Edmondson, a quien varias
décadas de lecturas y pensamiento crítico le
permiten mantener el tono aforístico y revoltoso
de un gran profesor a lo largo de libros enteros,
por ejemplo este. Edmondson es uno de los
mayores expertos en la vida y obra de
Shakespeare que puedan encontrarse, y también
uno de sus herederos en el sentido de "decir lo
cierto, no lo que es debido" ("El rey Lear").
Quizá porque sabe que Shakespeare siempre nos
devolverá a nuestra propia subjetividad, a lo que
queramos pensar con él. Y tal vez por eso no
tiene reparos en afirmar que "el Imperio
británico exportó a Shakespeare y lo impuso por
doquier junto con la lengua inglesa", al tiempo
que deja claro cómo, y por qué, el genio

incontestable del célebre poeta y dramaturgo no ha perdido vigencia e internacionalidad desde entonces; cómo se ha vuelto "culturalmente promiscuo". Edmondson da cuenta de la manera en que Shakespeare nos habla a todos, y de por qué su sensibilidad política es atemporal. Así nos relata que Hitler prohibió un montaje de "Julio César" en Alemania, y cómo el carácter más humano que local de la obra convirtió una puesta en escena de "Trabajos de amor en vano" en el Kabul de 2005 -que por primera vez en treinta años ponía a hombres y mujeres en un escenario- en un acto tan atrevido como lo fue una representación de "Otelo" en el Johannesburgo del "apartheid". ¿Por qué Shakespeare? He aquí la pregunta que articula todas estas páginas y que Edmondson lleva una vida entera haciéndose. Y he aquí un libro lleno de respuestas que, al mismo tiempo, plantean otra cantidad de interrogantes que solo nosotros podemos contestar. Prerrogativas del arte y de cómo lo hacemos nuestro. Os 154 sonetos de Shakespeare são normalmente divididos em duas partes. Os da primeira parte, de 1 a 126, são endereçados a um "Fair Youth", aqui designado "Belo Rapaz"; já os sonetos da segunda parte, de 127 a 154, são endereçados a uma "Dark Lady", aqui designada "Dama Escura". As duas partes se sobrepõem e se entrelaçam. A presente tradução, fruto de um trabalho de fôlego, apresenta aos leitores modernos uma versão igualmente erudita e acessível: a edição, além de bilíngue, traz notas de rodapé e uma tradução em prosa para cada soneto, além de prefácio assinado por Leandro Karnal. The debate over the true authorship of Shakespeare's body of work began not long after the death of William Shakespeare, the obscure actor and entrepreneur from Stratford-Upon-Avon who was assumed to be the author. Being an uneducated son of a glover who had never left England, the chances that William Shakespeare produced infamous works like Hamlet are slim. This is the first complete literary biography of Edward de Vere, and finds in his history all the background material found in Shakespeare's plays. A truly fascinating study. King Lear is a tragedy written by William Shakespeare. It depicts the gradual descent into madness of the title character, after he disposes of his kingdom giving bequests to two of his

three daughters based on their flattery of him, bringing tragic consequences for all. Derived from the legend of Leir of Britain, a mythological pre-Roman Celtic king, the play has been widely adapted for the stage and motion pictures, with the title role coveted by many of the world's most accomplished actors. A tragédia de Hamlet, príncipe da Dinamarca, geralmente abreviada apenas como Hamlet, é uma tragédia de William Shakespeare, escrita entre 1599 e 1601. A peça, situada na Dinamarca, reconta a história de como o Príncipe Hamlet tenta vingar a morte de seu pai, Hamlet, o rei, executado por Cláudio, seu irmão, que o envenenou e em seguida tomou o trono casando-se com a rainha. A peça traça um mapa do curso de vida na loucura real e na loucura fingida — do sofrimento opressivo à raiva fervorosa — e explora temas como a traição, vingança, incesto, corrupção e moralidade. Um jovem príncipe se reúne com o fantasma de seu pai, que alega que seu próprio irmão, agora casado com sua viúva, o assassinou. O príncipe cria um plano para testar a veracidade de tal acusação, forjando uma brutal loucura para traçar sua vingança. Mas sua aparente insanidade logo começa a causar estragos - para culpados e inocentes. Esta é a sinopse da tragédia de Shakespeare, agora em nova e fluente tradução de Lawrence Flores Pereira. A trágica historia de Hamlet, príncipe de Dinamarca, de William Shakespeare, é unha obra profunda, complexa e enigmática que transcende os límites da traxedia de vinganza. O seu protagonista ten sobre a súa conciencia a dura tarefa de vingar o aleivoso asasinato de seu pai perpetrado polo seu propio irmán, Clodio, para arrebatarlle a coroa e a esposa; pero para iso el mesmo debe converterse en asasino. Antes de consumir a vinganza, que inevitablemente acabará en catástrofe, Hamlet será responsable, directa ou indirectamente, doutras mortes. É unha traxedia de dimensións e resonancias universais. This book argues that Shakespeare is not the exclusive possession of any one social group or cultural formation, but has provided an enabling and empowering resource which has allowed 'other' radical voices to be heard. Shakespeare's Spiral aims to explore a figure forgotten in the dramatic texts of Shakespeare and in Renaissance painting: the snail. Taking as its point of departure the emergence of the gastropod object/subject in the text of King Lear as well as its iconic interface in Giovanni Bellini's painting Allegory of Falsehood (circa 1490), this study sets out to follow the particular path traced by the snail throughout the Iuvre.

From the central scene in which the metaphor of the snail and of its shell is specifically made manifest when Lear discovers, in a raging storm, the spectacle of Edgar disguised as Poor Tom coming out of his shelter (III.3.6-9) to the monster, this fiend, displaying on the cliffs of Dover, 'horns whelked and waved like the enridged sea' (IV.6.71), this work is the trace of a narrative - of a journey of the gaze - during the course of which the cryptic question of the gastropod - 'Why a Snail [_]?' (I.5.26) - does not cease to be developed and transformed. Incorporating a wide-ranging post-structuralist critique, the study aims to bring to light the particular functions of this 'revealing detail' in both its textual and visual dimension so as to put forward a new and innovative understanding of the tragedy of King Lear. Includes its Report, 1896-19. Migrating Shakespeare offers the first study of the earliest waves of Shakespeare's migration into Europe. Charting the spread of the reception and production of his plays across the continent, it examines how Shakespeare contributed to national cultures and - in some cases - nation building. The chapters explore the routes and cultural networks through which Shakespeare entered European consciousness, from first translations to stage adaptations and critical response. The role of strolling players and actors, translators and printers, poets and dramatists, is chronicled alongside the larger political and cultural movements shaping nations. This deception survived largely unscathed until 1920 when J. Thomas Looney's brilliant book, "Shakespeare" Identified, plucked

Edward de Vere out of historical obscurity and introduced him to the world as the real Shakespeare.
