Opened in 1814 as a pioneer county pauper institution, the Norfolk Lunatic Asylum, later St Andrew's Hospital, provided psychiatric care until 1998. Its history covers two centuries of different approaches to mental health care, reorganisations & disturbing events during times of national emergency.
