Personally and culturally, this force - which lives at the heart of our lives - has been diminished and wounded until it seems to have retreated beyond the horizon, in a world filled with rationalism and an anxious search for the material "good life." Neurofeedback is investigated as a treatment modality for reintegrating dissociated shadow aspects of the psyche's archetypal defenses. The attachment theories of psychologists John Bowlby and Margaret Ainsworth, and the research of neuroscientist Allan Schore, known as "the American Bowlby" for his discovery of the neurobiological basis of poor attachment in infancy, are examined for their elucidation of the early genesis of trauma and its causal link to later posttraumatic stress disorder (PTSD). Schore's research correlating poor attachment in infancy to negative impacts on the development of the right brain, which governs attachment, affect regulation, and stress modulation, is applied to a heuristic examination of how neurofeedback trains the brain to self-regulate, thereby reducing severe symptoms of PTSD. Neurofeedback's ability to normalize brain regulation of the central nervous system has implications for symptom reduction and stabilizing dysregulated nervous system function in trauma survivors, as indicated by the author's personal experience. Written for those working to heal developmental trauma and seeking new tools for self-awareness and growth, this book focuses on conflicts surrounding the capacity for connection. Explaining that an impaired capacity for connection to self and to others and the ensuing diminished aliveness are the hidden dimensions that underlie most psychological and many physiological problems, clinicians Laurence Heller and Aline LaPierre introduce the NeuroAffective Relational Model® (NARM), a unified approach to developmental, attachment, and shock trauma that, while not ignoring a person's past, emphasizes working in the present moment. NARM is a somatically based psychotherapy that helps bring into awareness the parts of self that are disorganized and dysfunctional without making the regressed, dysfunctional elements the primary theme of the therapy. It emphasizes a person's strengths, capacities, resources, and resiliency and is a powerful tool for working with both nervous system regulation and distortions of identity such as low self-esteem, shame, and chronic self-judgment. Two giants of twentieth-century psychology in dialogue C. G. Jung and Erich Neumann first met in 1933, at a seminar Jung was conducting in Berlin. Jung was fifty-seven years old and internationally acclaimed for his own brand of psychotherapy. Neumann, twenty-eight, had just finished his studies in medicine. The two men struck up a correspondence that would continue until Neumann's death in 1960. A lifelong Zionist, Neumann fled Nazi Germany with his family and settled in Palestine in 1934, where he would become the founding father of analytical psychology in the future state of Israel. As a survivor of trauma from childhood and the Iraq War, I draw on my dreams and discoveries in analysis in using heuristic and alchemical hermeneutic methods of inquiry to argue that a broader view of the self-care system is necessary. All psychological defenses can have soul-robbing and vitality-starving effects, and the type of defense is less important than the intensity of its application and how it distorts the personality. What is proffered is the book of Job as a symbolic history of Israel that stands as a counter-history beside the dominant history constructed in the canon's historical books—a counter-history whose function works to re-enliven the symbol of covenant. This thesis investigates challenges people endure post trauma when powerful trauma complexes and archetypal defenses have formed in the psyche. This work suggests that analytical and depth psychological approaches using the archetypal grid (the arrangement of figures representing complexes and archetypes) and the archetypal team (the relationships, dialogues, and interactions of the complexes and archetypes), which the author designed, during active imagination can help overcome these challenging complexes and archetypes. This paper is unique as the author has sought to mimic Carl Jung's own technique described in The Red Book where Jung entered deep into the unconscious and encountered there a space populated with images he later called complexes and archetypes. This is pioneering as Jung's work was only released in 2009. The research method used is heuristic with the author examining dreams and active imagination sessions using the archetypal grid and archetypal team and theories of complexes and archetypal defenses. Whether he is expounding on the Unconscious as a range of dimensions understandable in terms of nonlinear concepts of chaos, complexity, and emergence theory; modifying the psychoanalytic concept of psychic determinism by joining it to the concept of autochthony; comparing Melanie Klein's notion of the archaic Oedipus complex with the ancient Greek myth of the labyrinth and the Minotaur; or examining the relationship between the stories of Oedipus and Christ, Grotstein emerges as an analyst whose clinical sensibility has been profoundly deepened by his scholarly use of mythology, classical thought, and contemporary philosophy. The result is both an important synthesis of major currents of contemporary psychoanalytic thought and a moving exploration of the nature of human suffering and spirituality. Based on Jung's theory of complexes, this book offers a new perspective on conflicts between groups and cultures, demonstrating how the effects of cultural complexes can be felt in the behaviour of disenfranchised groups across the world. This book explores the roots of borderline states of mind in early relational trauma and shows how it is possible, and necessary, to visit 'the darkest places' in order to work through these traumas. This is despite the fact that re-experiencing such traumas is unbearable for the patient and they naturally want to enlist the analyst in ensuring that they will never be experienced again. This is the backdrop for the extreme pressures and roles that are constellated in the analysis that can lead to impasse or breakdown of the analytic relationship. The author explores how these areas can be negotiated safely and that, whilst drawing heavily on recent developments in attachment, relational, trauma and infant development theory, an analytic attitude needs to be maintained in order to integrate these experiences and allow the individual to feel, finally, accepted and whole. The book builds on Freud's views of repetition compulsion and re-enactment and develops Jung's concept of the traumatic complex. The Jungian approach to analysis and psychotherapy has been undergoing an extensive reconsideration during the past decade. Analytical Psychology calls special attention to the areas that have been most impacted: the core concepts and practices of the Jungian tradition, along with relevant intellectual and historical background.
